### Course Description

Introduces sculptural concepts and methods of production in traditional and contemporary media. Includes clay, plaster, wood, stone, metal, plastics and terra cotta. May include field trips. Prerequisite Art 131. Lecture 2 hours. Studio instruction 3 hours. Total 5 hours per week.

#### Introduction

Each class will begin with lectures, demonstrations and occasional handouts and short videos. Students will create sculpture and installations using additive, manipulative, substitutive and subtractive methods with multiple materials. Students will be able to create interesting and unique solutions to the inherent complications of sculpture as they construct their own conceptual platforms. Sculpture I focuses on 20th century sculptors and their works. Sculpture I follows the Modernist movement from Geometric Abstraction to Installation Art and will provide the opportunity for numerous hands-on original sculpture projects using clay, paper, wire, wood, plaster, recycled materials and foam-core. Students will deal with issues such as form, space, light, line, texture, color and movement as they create original work.

## Student Learning Outcomes

Upon successful completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- Demonstrate familiarity with basic sculpture terminology, tools, media and techniques.
- Students will create sculpture and installations using additive, manipulative, substitutive and subtractive methods with multiple materials.
- Create sculpture and installations using additive, manipulative, substitutive and subtractive methods with multiple materials.
- Create a sculpture based on a specific means of communication whether it is technical, situational or emotional.
- Create interesting and unique solutions to the inherent complications of sculpture as they construct their own conceptual platforms.
- Create original work.
- Participate in classroom critiques.

- Create expressive sculptures using principles to organize the art elements, including unity, proportion, emphasis, and balance.
- Use traditional as well as modern tools.
- Practice safe and responsible use of art media, equipment, and studio space.

# Portfolios/Assignments

Portfolios will be collected throughout the semester. Cumulatively, the portfolio will expand with each due date. Late portfolios will be graded down one letter grade for each class period late.

## Critiques

Students will present their portfolios to the instructor and the rest of the class and participate in a classroom critique of their own work and the art of the other students. It is important to give and receive feedback, as art is visual communication. We need to experience the richness of insights that are possible in a group setting. Your classmates are capable of

sharing a wealth of insight regarding how to improve your work and what might be holding you back from achieving your best.

## Attendance and Make-up Policy

Regular attendance is required. Late assignments will receive a lowered grade according to how late it is. In the extreme, missing more than 4 classes will result in an immediate failure.
