Research Comes To The Big Screen

Bring your research to life with two new collections of streaming videos. The library recently purchased a subscription to "Films on Demand", a collection of over 8,000 full-length videos in the fields of business & economics; science & mathematics; humanities & social sciences; health & medicine; as well as a collection of archival films and newsreels. In addition to full-length videos, the collection also includes 95,000 video clips.

The library also maintains a subscription to "American History in Video". This collection allows students and researchers to analyze historical events and their presentation over time through commercial and governmental newsreels, archival footage, public affairs footage and important documentaries.

Streaming videos have been integrated into the library catalog where users may search for materials across all format types and play videos directly from the catalog. Both collections are also accessible from the library homepage under Faculty Resources and Databases.

Films On Demand gives students and faculty instant access to thousands of programs neatly grouped into convenient, subjectspecific categories.

American History in Video provides the largest and richest collection of video available for the study of American history with over 5,800 videos and 2,000 hours of footage.

In keeping with the increased need for multi-lingual skills, New River Community College has announced its new World Languages Institute (WLI). The institute will offer three options for studying a variety of languages that will appeal to those enrolling as NRCC students, those seeking noncredit language study, and those seeking customized language training in business, industry and non-profit organizations.

Beginning in January 2012, college credit language courses will be offered through a new arrangement with Northern Virginia Community College. Students may choose from languages including Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Japanese and Russian. The courses will be offered as online distance education classes facilitated by NRCC. Online, non-credit languages are also available via NRCC's partnership with national leader in online education, ed2go. These six-week courses have new sessions beginning monthly and students may choose from classes such as Conversational Japanese, Instant Italian, Spanish for Law Enforcement and Speed Spanish.

Business, industry and nonprofit organizations will also see benefits from the new institute with the availability of customized language training ranging from short, travel-prep courses to semester-length college level courses

Library Adds World Language Resource

New River's World Languages Institute, offered jointly through NOVA, provides the impetus for the addition of a new language resource to the library's current resource offerings. Oxford Language Dictionaries Online (OLDO) features essential, comprehensive bilingual dictionaries and unique study materials that provide extra help with learning and using an expanding range of languages. Offering over 4 million words, phrases and translations in French, German, Spanish, Italian, Russian, and Chinese, OLDO also features native speaker audio pronunciations, allowing you to hear how words actually sound.

More than just a dictionary, OLDO offers a complete suite of language learning support materials for users of all levels. Students will also find clickthrough verb tables and pronunciation charts; explanations of grammatical terms; hundreds of sample letters, CVs and resumes; notes on life and culture; guidance on grammar and idiomatic usage; extensive links to other sites for further research and more.

Updates occur every six months and ensure that the most current meanings and the latest new words are just a click away, making OLDO an invaluable resource for students and professionals alike.
